11.30am – 12.15am LOCATING FAMILIES & HOUSES IN NORTH ANTRIM c.1830-1911

Dr. Bill Macafee, author and historian

Auditorium, Ballymoney Town Hall Finding the exact location of a house or a farm in which an ancestor lived during the nineteenth and early twentieth century can, sometimes, prove difficult, particularly for researchers who live abroad. The purpose of this session is to demonstrate, through the use of case studies, how this can be done by using a set of sources that span the period c.1830 to 1911. The sources include the Tithe Records of the 1820s and 1830s, the Townland Valuation of the 1830s, the Griffith's [Tenement] Valuation of c.1860, the Griffith's Revision Books which cover the period c.1860 to c.1930, and the Census Returns of 1901 and 1911.

events of a century ago. On the 28 September 1912, Protestant people across Ulster signed the
Ulster Covenant in a mass demonstration in opposition to Home Rule in Ireland. In Ballymoney

support for Sir Edward Carson's campaign. However, there was also opposition to the Covenant

Dr. William Roulston, Ulster Historical Foundation Auditorium, Ballymoney Town Hall Today, the Reformed Presbyterian Church of Ireland is a relatively small denomination, but one of the areas in which it is strongest is North Antrim. Reformed Presbyterians are also known as Covenanters because of their adherence to the National Covenant of 1638 and the Solemn League and Covenant of 1643. This talk will look at origins and early history of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of Ireland, with particular reference to North Antrim, and will discuss the sources that are available for the study of its members and adherents.

Colin Brooks, family historian

"The 1718 Project" was started by Colin Brooks and later enhanced by the Ulster-Scots Agency on their website. It focuses on the first mass migration of Ulster-Scots to America and explores their dispersal from Maine to New Hampshire to Massachusetts to Pennsylvania and ultimately the South. Colin's lecture reveals the story of these Ulster folk who eventually became the true pioneers of America. Among them are Ballymoney families: Boyd, Barr, Bell, Crombie, Dinsmore, McClellan, McCurdy, McKeen, McBride, Nesmith, Wason, Calwell, Woodside, Agnew, Dunlop, Gamble, Henry, McFredrick, Reid, Templeton and many more. Their legacy continues today with a direct link to a current American Senator and Presidential nominee.
